

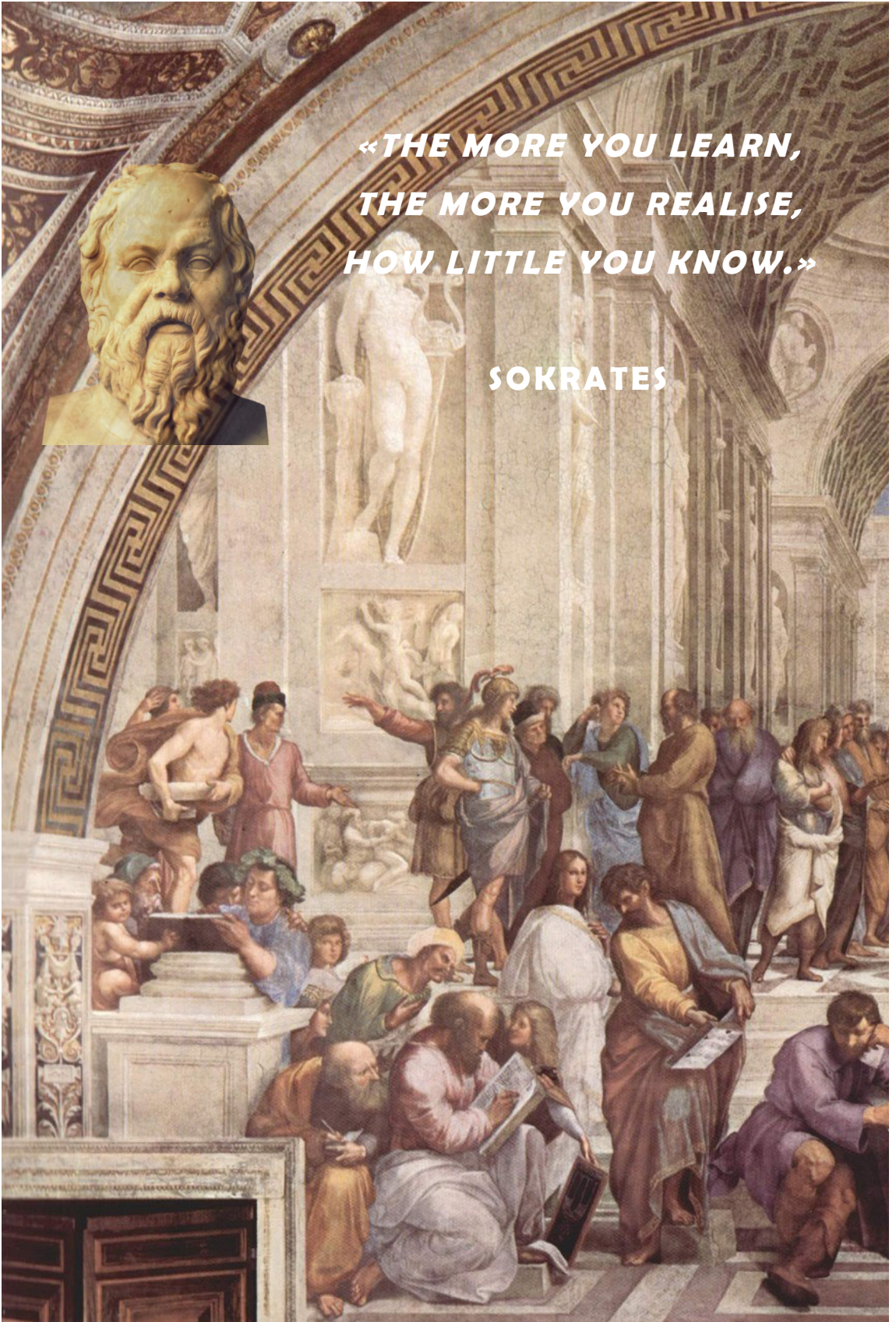

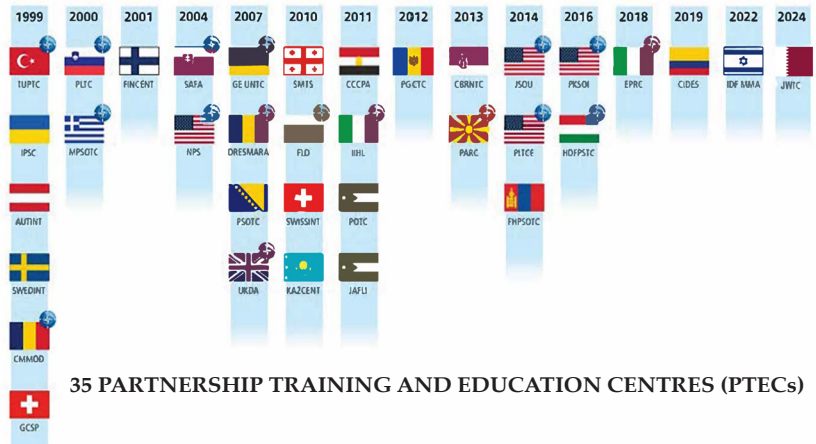

The Partnership Training and Education Centers (PTECs) are nationally or multi-nationally sponsored education and training institutions which are united under a single concept that is endorsed by the North Atlantic Council and recognized by NATO.

The PTECs offer courses, seminars, and workshops to both military and civilian personnel in order to provide education, training and instruction in diverse areas consistent with the objectives and priorities of NATO's policy on partnerships. They also provide a platform for operational training by offering both classroom and field venues for exercises.

Partnership Training and Education Centers (PTEC) play an essential role in supporting NATO's objectives for partnership with non-member countries. Initially launched in 1998, PTECs were formally established in 1999 under the Partnership for Peace program to develop training and education activities with Euro-Atlantic partners.

To reflect the changes in the Alliance's Global Partnerships, the PTEC Concept was extended to the Mediterranean Dialogue (MD) and the Istanbul Cooperation Initiative (ICI) countries in 2008. Since 2012, a single concept for all centres hosted by Allies, EAPC/PfP, MD and ICI partners, as well as partners across the Globe with a partnership program with NATO, while respecting the specificity of the different partnership frameworks, is in place.

As a result, the opening of facilities for Education and Training (E&T) in NATO Nations and Partner Countries has led to enhanced interoperability for NATO-led multinational operations.

The Partnership Training and Education Centers Commandants Conference (PTEC CC) was established by NATO in November 2000 to coordinate the work amongst the Centers and NATO. The first PTEC community was administered by the Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe (SHAPE) Partnership Coordination Cell (PCC) from 2000 until 2002. The NATO School became the Chairman in 2002 and HQ SACT became Co-Chairman in 2013.

Hellenic MPSOTC was founded in 1998 and since May 2000 is a certified PfP (Partnership for Peace) training center by NATO. In addition, it has been recognized as a training center by the UN to conduct UN Military Observers Courses as well as courses in relation to the Common Security and Defense Policy, as a member of the network of the European Security and Defense College (ESDC).

Since 2019 the Center has received unconditional quality accreditation from NATO, which reflects the high standards of the education provided. The result of this is the recognition of the Center's role in International Military training.

MPSOTC forges ties with the Academic community through cooperation with Universities (Aristotle University, University of Macedonia, International University of Thessaloniki), cooperates with International Organizations (E S D C , O S C E , F r o n t e x ,

NATO School Oberammergau, CIMIC COE, StratCom COE, RACVIAC) and International Educational Centers as well as other training centers from the Partnership Training and Education Centers (PTECs) Community.

The aim of this extensive network of cooperation is to provide up to date training to the participants through the completion of important training and educational activities such as international courses, seminars, conferences and Mobile Training Teams (MTTs).

The Hellenic Multinational Peace Support Operations Training Center plays an important role in the training of the Hellenic Armed Forces by providing specialized training in a multitude of fields, as well as training for the Hellenic Peacekeeping Forces, before their deployment.

The professionalism, dedication and commitment of MPSOTC ensures that the education provided exceeds any expectations of the students, as well as any requirements for harmonization with the educational standards that have been set.

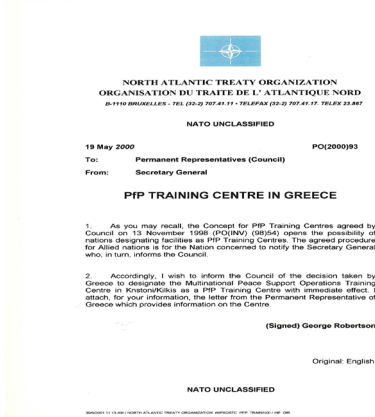

Overview

The Multinational Peace Support Operations Training Center (MPSOTC) is one of the 35 existing in the world, NATO/PfP Training and Education Centers. It has been officially recognized with the name “PfP Training and Center in Greece” by NATO SG since 2000. It is an active member of Partnership Training and Education Centers (PTEC's), Community, which is coordinated by ACT.

The Center is also recognized by UN, for organizing and conducting the “UN Military Observers’ Course”.

The primary mission, is to provide a multifaceted academic and realistic practical training, to Military, Police and Civilian multinational students, on PSOs related issues. MPSOTCs' training is fully complying with the most recent international accepted standards (NATO-UN-EU-OSCE), supported by its Quality Assurance Policy. The QA Policy was approved by NATO ACT QA Team, as unconditional in 2019 for 6 years. The accreditation will be distributing to students with a special badge on the course certificate. This factor establishes MPSOTC as the tenth PTEC which acquired Quality Assurance Certification on Training, and proves the Center commitment to continually training improvement. On 10-11 April 2024, MPSOTC's Quality Management System (QMS) had been assessed by the NATO Quality Assurance (QA) Team of Experts, with a particular emphasis on enhancing the excellence of its training programs.



Moreover, the Center supports the national contingents training and the education of Staff elements during the mission predeployment preparation for UN, NATO and EU led missions. Also, MPSOTC can provide MTT (Mobile Training Teams) upon request covering specific training topics. Training delivery is provided by MPSOTC Instructors, guest instructors and lecturers from national and international academic environment, and organizations (NATO, UN, EU, OSCE).

In that direction, MPSOTC maintains special relation with academic institutes and entities, such as University of Macedonia and Aristotle University in Thessaloniki, National Defence College and European Security and Defence College (ESDC). Additionally, from 2020 MPSOTC has sign a Letter of Intention with TNTD/OSCE (Transnational Threats Department/Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe) and co-organise the joint Cultural Property Protection Course.

All courses are open to NATO, Pff, MD, ICI ,Partners across the globe,as well as to IOs (UN,EU,OSCE). More details can being reached in our official web page.

The working language is English. Students should be able to comply with NATO STANAG 6001 requirements [Listening Good (3), Speaking Fair (2), Reading Good (3), Writing Fair (2)] or CEFR B2.

MPSOTC maintains 2 reserved posts for international Staff Officers and Instructors, declaring that its international character and orientation.

Admin Issues

The MPSOTC, is located in «Papatheofilou» Army Camp, at Kristoni, 2 Km from Kilkis, and 40 min driving time from Thessaloniki. Access to the Training Centre is possible by car, train or bus.

Transportation from/to “MAKEDONIA” (SKG) airport in Thessaloniki is provided for free, for all students by MPSOTC. Participants have to inform MPSOTC about their travel arrangements at least one week prior to their arrival. Otherwise, transportation will be the student’s own responsibility.

Dress Code : Battle Dress Uniform (BDU) is required during training (or “smart casual” for civilians). For official social events, jacket and tie is required (or similar for ladies).

Participants would enjoy the use of medical facilities provided by the Greek Army. If a special treatment might be needed, it will be provided by the 424 Military Hospital in Thessaloniki, at 24/7 status. Emergencies are treated in Kilkis General Hospital. Dental care lies on participants’ own expenses.

Application and seat allocation procedure follow the “first come, first served” basis and for each course, an official invitation detailed letter is circulated through official channels and authorities. Expression of interest is taking place through the relevant request (application form) and upon approval, an official confirmation message is following.

Visits to Vergina Archaeological Site where the Greek archaeologist Manolis Andronikos unearthed the burial site of the Macedonian kings, including the tomb of Philip II, father of Alexander the Great. Some of the most impressive and important exhibits from the Macedonian dominated period of the Greek history. Hundreds of items are displayed including the shield and armour of King Philip and the famous golden larnax.



Visits to the War Museum of Thessaloniki where are exhibited more than 10000 memorabilia presenting significant shapes of modern era's history of Greece. Also visits to Fort Rupel in Serres, a fortress at the North border of Central Macedonia, Greece, built in 1914. Became famous for its defence during the German invasion of Greece in April 1941, where German and Bulgarian armies were completely stopped due to this.

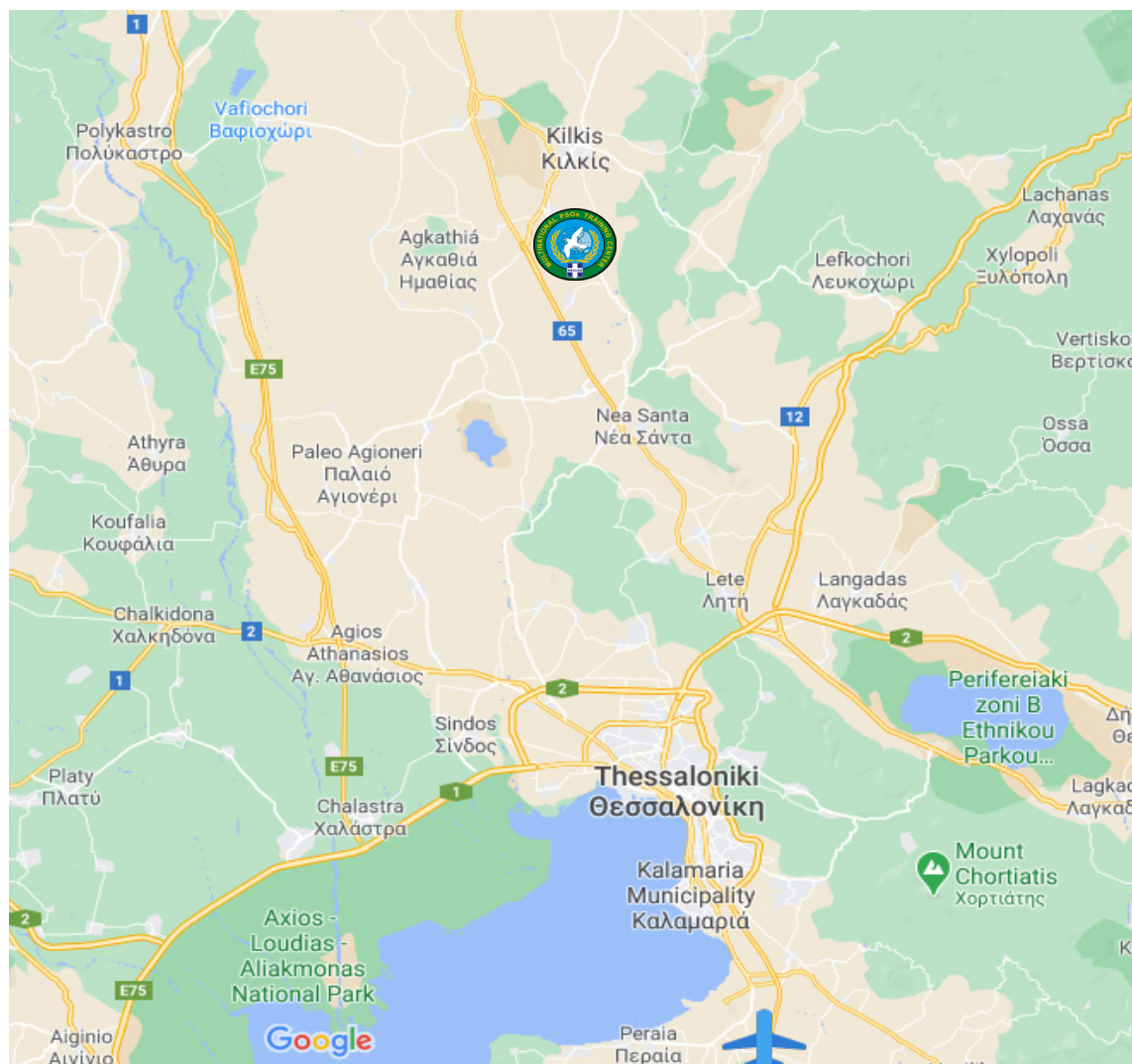

The municipality of Kilkis is located 48 km north of the city of Thessaloniki, and 66 kilometres from the international Thessaloniki airport “MAKEDONIA” (SKG). It covers 323,8 square kilometres and its population is about 25.000. Kilkis is the economic, commercial and cultural centre of the region.

TRAIN: Thessaloniki railway terminal, is located in the heart of the city. It is accessible with bus line No 01X starting from the airport. The Railway station of Kilkis, is about 400m, from MPSOTC main gate.



SHUTTLE BUS: Thessaloniki bus terminal is located in the heart of the city. It is accessible with bus line No 01X starting from the airport. Daily departures, connect the city with Kilkis almost every hour.

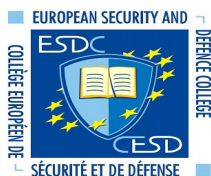

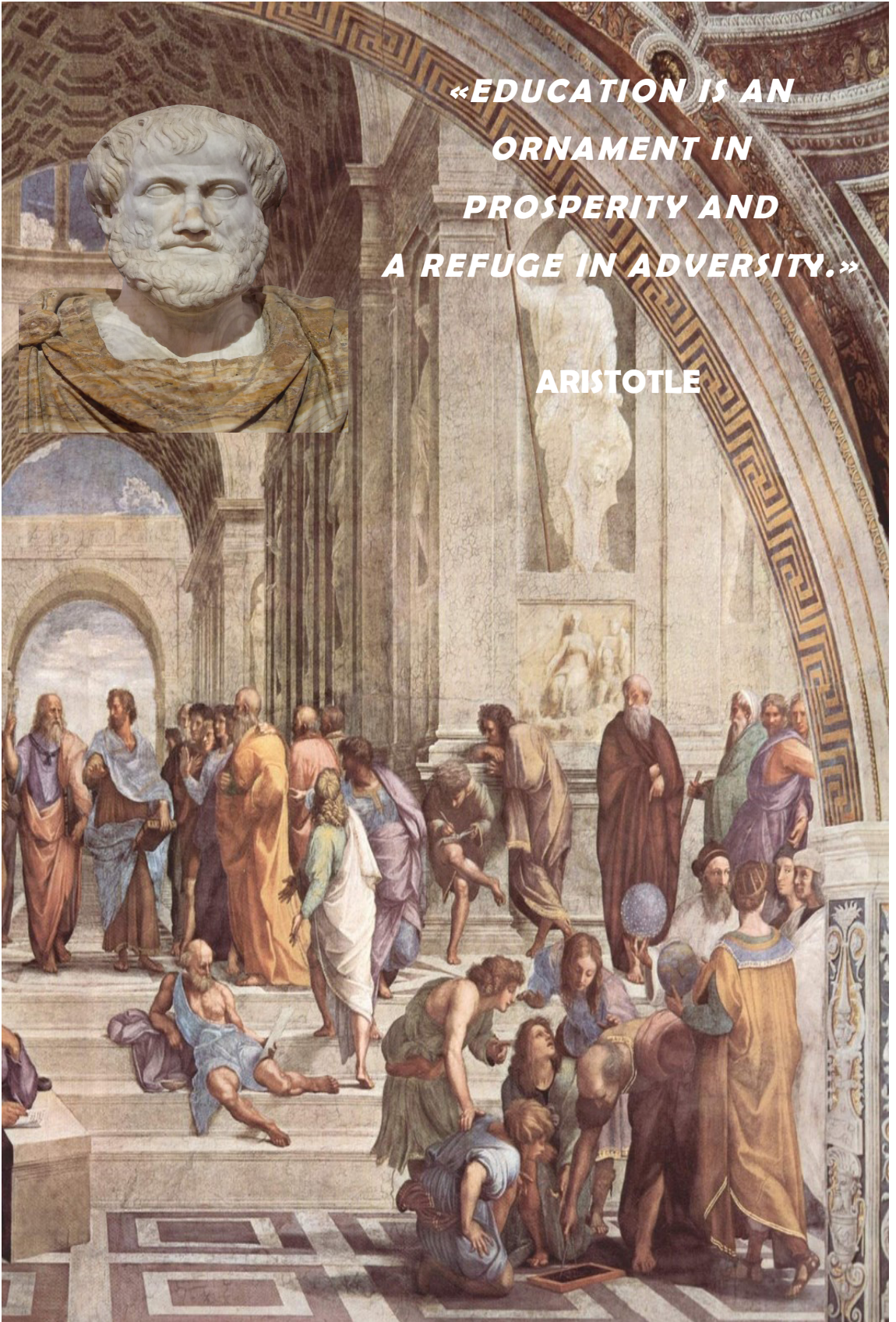
